The IQAC has taken significant steps towards quality enhancement and development of the college. These are enumerated as: -

- For enhancement of ICT, a SMART Board has been installed in a class room.
- An awareness programme for entry into services was organized on 23.08.2014. Mr. Jogesh Baruah (ACS). Addl. Deputy commission Tinsukia and Mr. Rakesh Agrawal, course coordinator, Career Solution for Bank, SEE and competitive exams were the resource persons.
- Organized coaching classes for entry into services on 10.04.2015. Arup Kr. Deka, Career Counselor and Columnist of Guwahati was the resource person.
- An entrepreneurship awareness programme was organized on 22nd – 23rd September, 2014 in association with Indian Institute of Entrepreneurship, Guwahati. Mr. L.M. Adhikari and Mr. R.K.Deori, faculties, IIE, Guwahati, were the resource persons.
- A popular talk on “Wildlife Conservation with reference to laboratory for conservation of endangered species” was organized by Zoology Department on 06.08.2014. Mr. Shyamal Dutta, Director, Resource of Aranyak, Guwahati and Dr. Karthikeyan Vasudevan, senior Principal Scientist, Laboratory for Conservation of Endangered species (La CONES) of Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology, Hyderabad was the resource person.
- The college and Sahitya Academi jointly organized a unique programme “KAVISANDHI” on 28.08.2014 at Digboi College. Dr. Karabi Deka Hazarika, convener of Assamese Language Advisory Committee, Sahitya Academi and Mr. Hare Krishna Deka, renowned poet, critic and ex DGP, Assam were the resource persons.
- A three month course on “Computer Hardware and Networking” (Entrepreneurship and Skill Development Programme) sponsored by Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) and IIE, Guwahati was conducted on and from 25th oct, 2014. The course was attended by 30 students of surrounding area.
- A UGC funded certificate course on “Wildlife Conservation” was inaugurated by Mr. Rackybul Hussain, Minister of Forest, Environment and Panchayat and Rural Development, Govt. of Assam on 28.10.2014.
- A four days programme of Civil Defence Training Camp – Exercise. Demonstration and Workshop was organized from 23rd to 26th May, 2015. 50 students participated in the programme.
- A three days training on cutting and embroidery was imparted to girl students on and from 23.06.2015 by Ms. Deepali Dutta, owner of “Gamkharu”, Designer and Entrepreneur, Digboi. The programme was conducted by Digboi College Women Welfare Cell (DCWWC). 46 girl students participated in the training.
- An All India NSS mega camp was held at Digboi College on 28.01.2015. 400 numbers of students and teachers from 27 states of India participated in the programme.
- IQAC, Digboi College and State Bank of India, Digboi Branch jointly organized an interactive session “i-collect” among heads of institutions of Digboi on 26.09.2014.
- A four days Wildlife Exhibition and a Quiz was organized on and from 20.10.2014, jointly by Digboi College and the NGOs “Aranyak” and “Evergreen”.
- IQAC and Department of Education organized a workshop on teaching in elementary education from 23.02.2015 to 08.03.2015. Amor Upadhayaya, Asst Prof. Deptt of Education, Dibrugarh University, Radha Kanta Gogoi, Retired Head Master, Homnath Upadhayaya, Assist. Prof. Ledo College were the resource persons. 67 students participated in the workshop.
- The International Yoga camp was held centrally at Digboi College on 21/06/2015. The camp was organized by NCC unit of Digboi College. A good number of students from different institutions of Digboi participated in the programme.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Our Vision:

The college has a vision of imparting quality education. Quality education would create holistic atmosphere for the students to cater to the demands of a modern technological and global world while inculcating in them the values and cultural heritage, India is known for.

Our Mission:

The college aims at-

- i) Educating its students to become responsible, competent and ethical citizens of the world with the skill to think creativity analyse critically and communicate effectively.
- ii) Encouraging the students to pursue their courses with resolute determination, equanimity of mind and honesty of character.
- iii) Fostering global competency among students so that they can prepare themselves for the opportunities and challenges of life.
- iv) Stimulating the academic ambience for quality sustenance and quality enhancement
- v) Building strong bonds with all the stake holders through dedicated team work, innovative strategies and commitment to excellence.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The common information systems are Notice Board, Web-site, group SMS etc. Notices are circulated among teaching and non-teaching staff in urgent need. The authority also discusses the important issues by convening meeting with HoDs, staff members and the students whenever necessary.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development:

The curriculum is designed by the University. However, teachers take part in the meetings of Board of Studies and Undergraduate Board as invitees.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning:

For quality improvement in the teaching learning process, the college adopts the strategies of remedial coaching, departmental seminar, GD, Field trip, one to one contact, class for stratified groups, interactive class, solving of previous years' questions. The teachers are encouraged to participate in OC, RC, various staff training programme, workshop on discipline related areas,. Necessary and up to date teaching materials are provided for continuous improvement of teaching – learning activities. In this session the following facilities are procured-

- (1) New Computer sets have been provided to Mathematics and Chemistry and Commerce departments
- (2) Free internet access provided to teachers and students.
- (3) SMART BOARD has been installed in a class room.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation:

A group of teachers (Examination conduction committee) conducts the university examinations in our college centre. The teachers appointed by Dibrugarh University take part in paper setting, paper examiners, scrutiny, head examiners , internal and external practical examiners etc. As per university guidelines the internal examinations are held. The examined papers are shown to students for verification and mark sheets are displayed in the notice board.

6.3.4 Research and Development:

The college encourages the teachers to procure Major/ Minor Research Projects, FIP etc. Sanctions leave to the research scholar; adjusts classes with flexi-timing and exempts them from some other co-curricular activities. Also encourages attending National/ International seminars/ Workshop/ Conference etc.

A budgetary provision has been made for allocation of fund for departmental / inters disciplinary research projects.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation:

- During this session, 1587 text books, 39 reference books, 169 journals and 195 other periodicals have been enriched in the library.
- One SMART BOARD has been installed.
- The ongoing projects are Indoor stadium, Chemistry department.
- Renovation of the auditorium, girls' common room, cycle stand, examination conduction room, canteen, NCC office, Union office has been completed.
- An orchidarium for Botany department is under construction.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management:

The IQAC keeps vigilance so that the classes are regularly held; the office staff and library staff render their help towards the benefit of the students. The IQAC keeps close contact with departments, office, library and the hostels and assesses the man power. If any shortage found, then immediately brings it to the notice of the authority for early recruitment. Sometimes it takes time to fill up the permanent posts owing to official formalities and during this period the posts are generally filled up on ad – hoc basis so that the system is not disrupted.

The teachers have been assessed by the students for their quality improvement. They are also encouraged to carry out research works, upgrade and update knowledge by attending refresher course, orientation course, short term course etc. The teachers have also been facilitated for their carrier progression.

The office staffs has been deputed to attend workshop for their enhancement of work efficiency

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment:

The college authority adopts fool- proof policy in case of faculty and staff members. It publishes the vacancy through News Papers/ employment exchange and screens by a committee constituted as per the Govt. Rules. Roster system is strictly followed. The recruitment process is a lengthy procedure. First, prior permission is to be taken for advertisement of the vacant posts from Govt of Assam. After selection, approval of the appointment is compulsory from the Govt of Assam.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration:

Some of the students visit the neighbouring industries with teacher – guide for their project works.

6.3.9 Admission of Students:

The college takes steps for wide publicity through notices, hoardings, banners, prospectus, web-site etc. The students are selected on the basis of merit. However, follows the reservation norms as laid by the Govt.; special consideration for disadvantaged students is taken.

The college extends all possible supports to teaching staff for their career progression and research works. The non- teaching staff are also deputed for training to enhance their efficiency. The college revises the salary of the temporary workers time to time to relieve them from growing market cost.

The college has taken plantation programme to make the campus more greenery and has declared the campus as polythene free zone. Moreover, the NCC cadets take up cleaning programme every now and then.

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

- The college has introduced a mentoring system. The students are divided into some small groups on random basis and a teacher in charge interacts with them, tries to explore their problems, hidden talents and future expectations and advises them accordingly.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution (*please see the format in the NAAC Self-study Manuals*)

Best practice – I

1. Title of the Practice:

Wildlife Rescue and Awareness Drive

2. Goal:

Digboi College is not far from Dehing Patkai Reserve Forest and is a hot spot of biodiversity. Some rare species are found in this region. Sometimes the animals come out of the forest, enter the village area and fall into prey. A team of faculty members of the college has been extending yeomen’s service to rescue the animals and also organizes several awareness camps on wildlife conservation, rescuing measures etc.

3. The Context:

After implementation of semester system in the college, the faculty members have to keep busy themselves with their up-to-date routine works. Therefore, they have little time in the college hours and cannot give full-time devotion. But then, the team has been facing the challenges and rendering their services to their best.

4. The Practice:

This year, the team has rescued an injured giant flying squirrel near Margherita College, a female leopard near Digboi, an elephant calf at Saraipung, another female elephant calf at Raffiala Tea Estate (Pengree), a female sub-adult common leopard at Ma-Kali Tea Estate (Borjan) and another flying squirrel (Digboi). Moreover, the team has rescued a good number of snakes of various species and releases into the forest. The people of Digboi and its vicinity call over phone and the team rushes to the spot and captures the snake even at night.

The team has been organizing or involved in several awareness camps in this locality. Digboi College has MoU with Aaranyak, an NGO. The college has set up a “**Wildlife Conservation Extension Centre**” at Saraipung under the auspices of Digboi Forest division. The college has organized awareness camps several times on conservation of Wild Life in the forest village of Saraipung.

Mr. R. R. Tariang of Zoology department has been imparting training to Forest Guards of Makum in a number of occasions on conservation of Snakes and First Aid measures to be adopted in case of snake bites. Mr. Tariang has been undertaking a research project based on Asian Elephant in Dehing Patkai Reserve Forest under Asian Elephant Research & Conservation Programme under Aranyak.

5. Evidence of Success:

It has been noticed that the college fraternity, the villagers from local and surrounding areas are now highly conscious about conservation of Wild Life. Many students of the college have been trained to identify non-venomous/ venomous snakes and handling it. Many people of the surrounding areas call over phone and the team rescues the animals and releases them into the forest after taking care. The team has also been busy with birding and has organized several awareness camps which are attended by many people.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

To carry out this practice, time and money are important factors as the team has to go distant villages, tea gardens etc. Moreover, it is difficult to impart training to the illiterate people at initial stage.

7. Notes:

It is most obvious that wild life conservation is not one man’s business. It must be a concomitant and joint effort. Until and unless the practice is pervaded to every strata of the society, the success is far behind. In fact, it must be a concerted venture. Just as the drops of water together create a sea, such a practice of college fraternity may ripple far and wide.

Best practice – II

1. Title of the Practice:

Financial support to poor and distressed students

2. Goal:

The college is situated in a backward area and many of the students come of poor family. For them higher education is like a day dream only. In view of this the college and the teaching staff raise funds to provide financial support to the poor but meritorious students. Moreover, every effort has been made so that maximum number of students can enjoy Govt. Scholarships.

3. The context:

As the number of students coming from lower income group is more, so it is really a complicated problem for addressing their acute hardship and the college has to face a challenging problem.

4. The Practice:

The college has created an “Aid Fund” collecting a very nominal amount from the students annually. A sub-committee constituted from this Fund invites application from the poor, meritorious students with proper supporting documents. After screening, the committee selects a number of genuine students and distribute cheques among them. The “Digboi College Teachers’ Unit” has also raised a “Fund” by contributing an amount monthly. The Teacher Body also adopts similar procedure to disburse the fund among the selected students. In 2009-10 session 55 numbers of students have been supported by the institution and 142 numbers of students were able to get Govt. Scholarship. Due to financial constraints limited number of students has benefitted. The college has also granted free-ship to some students from its own fund.

5. Evidence of success:

Due to this financial support many students are able to pursue for higher studies. Some of them have been graduated as a result of this practice.

6. Problems encountered and Resources Required:

The college and the Teachers’ Body have to face a lot of problems in generating the Fund to a desired level. Moreover, the number of students from lower income group is also high. So, the quantum of support is not sufficient.

7. Notes:

In India many families are still below poverty line and at the same time literacy rate is not satisfactory. In this context, more financial support from any organisation may catalyse the process.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

- The college observes “ World Environmental Day” every year in association with Assam Science Society, Digboi Branch, in various schools in and around Digboi, catering to environmental awareness and protection. Tree sapling have been collected from Forest Department, Govt of Assam and planted in different institutions/organizations. Organised rallies with slogans and placards to make aware of the common people of their responsibilities towards environmental protection and check pollution.
- The college campus had already been declared as polythene free zone and communicates the various institutions to adopt this measure and convey message through the pupils of the hazardous effect of polythene.
- Mr R. R Tariang and Mr Gauri Buragohain, faculties of the college have been emphatically involved in caring the injured snakes and protecting them and have organised several awareness programme in neighbouring areas. The details have been shown in **Annexure III (Page no 33)**.

The college has clear vision and mission. Learning environment is conducive for thinking and creativity. The college ensures effective curriculum delivery, has adequate programme options, and caters to diverse groups. The admission process is transparent. The college has strong concern about gender, ragging, environmental issue etc. Students are provided hostel facilities, internet browsing, common rooms, pure drinking water, health insurance, financial assistance to poor and distress ones, student free- ship, cultural and literary exposures etc. The NCC unit is very active and some cadets have been awarded. The college has in practice of awarding to best graduate of the college, toppers of all stream, most regular students, best library user etc. Moreover, from this year Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam memorial financial help to the poor but meritorious students has been introduced for their progression. The college has competent and dedicated staff.

Despite all efforts made, the drop-out rate is still high. The library could not be fully digitalized, no formal linkage with National Knowledge Network. The college has no MoU with institutions of National/International importance, other universities or corporate houses till now.

The college is situated in an area surrounded by Oil and Coal industries, tea gardens and deep forest areas. Hence there is enough scope for opening some diploma or certificate courses related to these sectors. The college has not yet been able to open PG regular courses. The college has also opportunities for interaction, consultancy and collaboration with the neighboring giant industries.

The college has to take urgent steps in dwindling student dropout rate, to provide more ICT enabled class rooms, to organize more coaching classes and exchange programmes. The faculty members also have to procure more major and minor research projects. The college must have MoU with neighboring industries and to open employment generated courses.

Injured giant flying squirrel rescued

DIGBOI, March 10 – An injured giant flying squirrel was rescued from the house of one Pranjal Saikia adjacent to Margherita College, Margherita at 4.15 pm on March 5 last. After receiving the information of the injured animal from Dr Amarjit Saikia, Associate Professor in the Dept of Sociology of Margherita College, Rajib Rudra Tariang, a wildlife biologist and assistant professor in the Dept of Zoology and Dipesh Mondal, assistant professor, both from Digboi College rushed to the site to rescue it.

The squirrel which bore injury marks on its left arm was successfully captured and brought to the Digboi Forest Range office. Dr Nupur Buragohain, a wildlife veterinary doctor of the Wildlife Trust of India was informed of the capture of the injured squirrel. Dr Buragohain suggested immediate first aid treatment, and provided medicines and fruits. After the first-aid treatment, the injured animal was transferred to Dhola Wildlife Rescue Centre for further treatment.

Leopard rescued near Digboi

Dibrugarh, June 9: A female leopard (*Panthera pardus*) was today rescued around 11am from the house of Brajanti Gogoi, a resident of Torajan, around 25km from Digboi.

Torajan tea estate is under Digboi forest division in Tinsukia district.

Rajib Rudra Tariang, assistant professor, department of zoology, Digboi College, who assisted the NGOs in the rescue mission, said, “The leopard got trapped inside a cage, which was made by Brajanti to capture it. The cage was made of wood with two chambers separated by wire nets. Brajanti kept two puppies inside the cage as bait.” Tariang said when the leopard went inside the chamber to eat the puppies, which were kept in the other chamber separated by wire nets, the trap door dropped shut.

The local forest department staff was informed yesterday around 10.30pm and they arrived this morning to inspect the captive leopard.

The animal was released in Upper Dehing reserve forest, 20km from Digboi.

DIGBOI, July 3: An awareness programme on wildlife conservation was organized at the Pengaree TE staff club for school students, sardars, workers and office staff on Wednesday. The awareness programme was an initiative of Apeejay Tea Ltd to mark the occasion of Van Mahotsav – an annual tree-planting forest festival in India celebrated in the first week of July.

A female elephant calf probably 4-7 day rescued

An elephant calf was rescued, at 5.am on 24/11/2014 and informed by a villager name Mr. Bolin Chetia of Bramajan Tinali, sighted an elephant calf in a ditch of a tea garden of Raffiala TE, Pangeery, which is approximately 1.5 km away. A total of 4 NGOs of this region assisted the Forest Department of Doomdoma Forest Division of Khatangpani. The NGOs were Aaranyak Assam, Evergreen Foundation, Digboi College, and the Wildlife Trust of India, Dholla Branch. Mr. Porikshit Dutta, of Brahmajan had informed Mr. Abhijit Boruah, a researchers working for Aaranyak, a society for biodiversity conservation in northeast India, who then alerted Mr. Rajib Rudra Tariang, a member Aaranyak & Asst. Prof., of Zoology Department of Digboi College. Immediately, Mr. Tariang informed to DFO, Mr. Siraj Ahmed and Dr. Samshul Ali a veterinary surgeon working for CWRC, Kaziranga under Wildlife Trust of India. The wildlife enthusiasts and the wildlife activist immediately rushed to the spot and took all care to restore the dehydrated elephant calf. Electrolyte were provided and Dr. Samshul Ali, examined medically to the calf. The calf was very very young, and had been away from its mother for almost 14 hrs. and we tried our level best to look and reunite with the mother. Even we allowed the calf to call its mother and the calf did called, but no sigh by her mother. We also tried making a small temporary cage made of bamboo and sticks to keep the calf within it, as per norms and we were away from the sight, to make a way for the mother to come and take away the calf. The calf was crying for the mother, but no sign. I have also notice the tear drops of the baby elephant in her eyes, still I remember the moments and feeling very sad. At night, we decided, to shift to CWRC, Kaziranga, the calf, which had already become weak, and it was shifted to Kaziranga at midnight. The DFO, Mr. Siraj Ahmed provided a vehicle with three staffs, to shift it to the CWRC, Kaziranga. Dr. Samshul Ali and Hemanta Das of Wildlife Trust of India accompanied the calf to the CWRC, Kaziranga. The team reached at 4.30 am and the calf is fully taken care.

A female sub-adult Common Leopard was rescued by Maakali TE

Maakali TE garden officials, Tinsukia Wildlife Division operated capturing of this strayed Common Leopard at the edge forest area of Borajan Near Maakali TE. Green Brigade raised at Digboi

DIGBOI, July 19 - In the concluding function of the Van Mahotsav Week held on the premises of the Oirawat Bhawan at Kherjan area of Digboi, a 340-member strong Green Brigade comprising many women, from as many as nine joint forest management committees (JFMCs) and eight eco-development committees (EDCs) was raised amidst a large gathering. The gathering consisted of the inhabitants of the forest villages under Digboi Division, NGO members, conservationists, wildlife activists, mediapersons, local public and forest officials.

The declaration of the raising of the brigade was announced by RK Das, DFO of Digboi Division on behalf of the Deputy Commissioner of Tinsukia district, Puru Gupta who attended the function as the chief guest. The distinguished guests included the Wildlife DFO of Tinsukia, Mridul Dhar, HN Sarma, wildlife activist, Rajib Rudra Tariang, wildlife biologist.

This Green Brigade is the first of its kind in the State. The youths in 17 platoons of 20 each staged an impressive march-past before the chief guest at the start of the function.

The purpose of the function was stated by Krishna Gogoi. RK Das in his address, gave a detailed account of the conservation initiative undertaken by the Digboi Division of Forests since March 29 till date – a plethora of activities ranging from Green Tinsukia and Save Wildlife drive on Sundays in the interior villages of the division, development of nurseries, add-on plantation in the Digboi Arboretum, motivational drives among the forest villagers, etc. The division highlighted the rich biodiversity of the Dehing-Patkai region, by giving a new nomenclature to the Digboi-Duliajan Road as the Patkai Biodiversity Road. The stretch of road from Kherjan Beat Office up to Pengeri has been renamed as the Oirawat Path. He also mentioned that the process was on to raise the status of the Dehing-Patkai Wildlife Sanctuary to a national park.

Puru Gupta in his speech lauded the organised efforts of the Digboi Division of Forests towards conservation of forests and protection of wildlife. He urged the public to render full cooperation to the majestic natural heritage of Tinsukia district with 39 reserve forests, four sanctuaries and one national park. He suggested that DFO Das should introduce a ranking system among the EDCs and JFMCs for giving awards.
